Encountering Christ

Every day when I log on to my computer, Microsoft graces my desktop with a new picture. The picture might be of a beautiful vista, or a closeup of plant or animal life, or even a big city brilliantly lit up at night. Watching nature shows, we learn about creatures that bring us delight or make us laugh or at least wonder what God was thinking when God created those creatures. Like the panda bear that frolics in newly fallen snow; or the three-banded armadillo that rolls itself into a ball in the blink of an eye; or the nearly blind star-nosed mole that uses its nose of 22 tentacles to navigate; or the otherworldliness of the shoebill stork (which Harry Potter's Buckbeak was based on), supposedly descended from dinosaurs.

One of the wonderful things about nature is how it can point us to God. As the apostle Paul wrote: "...in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible..." (Col 1:16) God's fingerprints are all over everything and everywhere we go. But have you ever heard (or said) this: "I don't need to go to church because I worship God whenever I am out in the woods or in nature?"

It is a statement that glosses over what worship truly **is**. While God **is** present in nature, it is not where God wants to be found or known. While we can appreciate the beauty of God's creation, the sunset speaks no words about the promises of God. Martin Luther didn't deny that nature points us to God, but ultimately, God wants to be found in God's word of promise, made incarnate in Christ Jesus. The words we hear in worship are where God wants us to find God: in scripture and the preaching, and through the promises made to, and received by us, again and again in Holy Communion.

Without a doubt, nature displays God's majesty—but it cannot give us Jesus. Only in worship do we encounter the Triune God through scripture and sermon. Only in worship do we receive the physical presence of Christ, as bread and wine are placed into our hands and taken into our bodies. In worship, not only do we encounter the touchable, tangible Christ, we also get to hear his precious, life-giving, promise-filled words, meant just for us: This is my body and blood, given and shed for you.

In his weekly newsletter, author Jonny Sun recently wrote about eating with his parents at dumpling places and how they'd know which ones were the good ones. After their meal they'd ask the owner for bowls

of the dumpling water, something that was an important, comforting ritual within their own family after eating dumplings. It's not the water itself – which is apparently quite bland and boring – but the meaning of the tradition. If the owner didn't question the request and greeted it with a nod, they'd know this place was good one, not just because of the food but because of the sense of belonging that bowl of dumpling water provided them.

One of the primary things I've been told we need at Trinity as we make our way through transitions and emerge from heavier pandemic restrictions on our ministry is the opportunity to re-engage. Like Sun and his parents, what we seek as people within a community and what Trinity hopes to provide for all who connect and engage with us is a sense of belonging. Summer Worship at Trinity

This year we have several special worship opportunities planned as well as a different approach to our Sunday morning worship incorporating the Narrative Lectionary texts.

For decades the ELCA, and Trinity
Lutheran, have used the Revised
Common Lectionary; this is a three-year
cycle of assigned Scripture Readings,
Prayers, and other worship elements
that most of the main-line Protestant
denominations, as well as the Catholic

Church use to structure their worship.

In 2010, several professors from Luther Seminary released a new "Narrative Lectionary" which uses readings from the entire Bible in a more story-line based approach, which spans a four-year cycle (September-May) with special monthly series during the summers. This summer we will be using the series on "The Ten Commandments", and the books of "Ruth" and "1 Peter".

Outdoor worship will be back the third Wednesday of each month as part of the SUMMER NIGHTS programing. These will include a variety of worship styles, as well as Holy Communion, and a community meal.

We will continue the 9:00 Sunday Morning worship schedule with streaming throughout the summer.

GOOD ENOUGH IS NOT A CONCESSION, BUT AN ACCEPTANCE THAT WE ARE NOT ALONE IN THIS WORLD.

Good Enough at Any Age By Marc & Kinsey Mens

We had the opportunity to be part of an intergenerational bible study during Lent. We discussed the book *Good Enough*, by Kate Bowler. We met over Zoom every Monday evening for six weeks. As the book describes, the topic of our discussions was over the very real issue of existing as Good Enough in the eyes of our society, in our own eyes, and in the eyes of our Creator.

When discussing the title and concept presented in the book, our venerable veteran contingent was at odds: What do you mean *Good Enough*?! If it isn't done well then do it until it is, right? Yes, but we are *human*, the younger contingent explained.

Bowler writes with wit and candidness, about the difficult moments of weakness that all humans have: feelings of anxiety over finances, career trajectory and the impending future. Feelings of guilt for missing bible study or skipping

workouts. Feelings of frustration at our Creator because of losses we've endured. Feeling like we weren't given a fair shake.

But as we discussed our interpretations of Bowler's book, we came to an understanding that as humans, we are *Good Enough*. We are not perfect. We are not all-knowing and all-powerful; that is why we turn to God:

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light."

-MATTHEW 11:28-30


We were all thankful for the stories exchanged and the camaraderie experienced. We discussed some of our greatest losses, faults, and short-



comings, but we also discussed some of our greatest memories, loves and experiences: "It's like seeing a garment turned inside out and all the rough seams are showing. You see someone's absolute humanity shine through all the pain, and that vulnerability makes them more— not less—beloved. The great mystery of the world is peeking through, and we get just a glimpse... We understand holiness and mystery and fear and humility all in the same moment. And it is beautiful" (Bowler, p. 94).

Towards the end of our study, Ken Jenson asked, "What did you really think about this book?" The older generation replied that they thought it had been written for them and that it didn't apply to the younger generation. The younger generation replied the book was written for them. It appears that this message is applicable for all ages. Good Enough is not a concession, but an acceptance that we are not alone in this world. We can't do it alone; we aren't meant to. We are part of a congregation, and

even if we sometimes feel overwhelmed, we are together, with each other, and with God, and that is *Good Enough*.

TRINITARIANS MEET TO LEARN ALZHEIMER'S MEDICATION UPDATES



Our **Trinitarians*** gathered in the Shift Room Thursday, April 21, to hear information on the current and pending new advances on medications for the treatment of Alzheimer's Disease (AD).

The program was presented by longtime retail pharmacist and Trinity member, **Tim Mueller**. Tim has 48+ years as a pharmacist and has recently retired. He was Chief Pharmacist for stores in Minnetonka, Mound and Albertville. While Tim was at Thrifty White Drug in Mound, the pharmacy serviced nursing homes in Spring Lake Park and the Wellstad of Rogers. While in Mound, Tim was the Consultant Pharmacist for these homes cared for Alzheimer patients.

The group had a discussion regarding AD which included a power point presentation and a video showing the stages of AD with Tau buildup which leads to the Amyloid Plaques that cause neurodegeneration which harms the communication between neurons. We then moved on to a discussion of current medications used, side effects, warnings and interactions.

Tim then provided information regarding the new AD drug, *Aduhelm*, which is showing promise. This treatment is an IV infusion drug that actually binds to the Amyloid plaques to reduce the buildup in the brain tissue. However, *Aduhelm* has had problems being approved by the FDA and Medicare. Tim explained the criteria that must be met to be treated with this new medication.

The last segment of the presentation included a discussion on another new IV drug from **Eli Lilly** (*Alzforum*). This treatment also shows that it will reduce the Amyloid burden to normal levels. Eli Lilly tells us that this drug is on track to be available in 2023. Also discussed was the availability of a new blood test that will predict the risk of AD brain pathology in people with memory issues. This will be an important new tool for physicians to aid in the evaluation process of AD.

Attendees asked many questions throughout the presentation regarding these current and promising new medications.

The Trinitarians are for all adults who are available to get together during the day. We meet the third Thursday of the month and have other outings throughout the year.

Walk for Mkraine Refugees

In early March a group of our High School students gathered on a Sunday evening to pray for the refugees facing the hardship of a war thrust upon their literal doorsteps in Ukraine. The night was structured around looking at images of the refugees many of whom are children realizing that each person in this horrific event has a story, hopes, and dreams, a life not all that different from our own. From this powerful experience of shared prayer there was a collective response that maybe more could be done to help those in desperate need. As this is being written over 11 million Ukrainians have been displaced from their homes and over 5 million are now classified as refugees dispersed throughout several neighboring countries who have been willing to open their borders and homes to care for them. At the end of the prayer night students wrestled with this question-

WHAT CAN WE DO IN A TANGIBLE WAY TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE ON THEIR BEHALF, HALF A WORLD AWAY?

An idea emerged to hold a day of walking since so many of these refugees are walking miles and miles to reach safety. On a sunny May 7th, 148 individuals gathered on the Orono High School Track to take hourly shifts of non-stop walking on behalf of the Ukrainians, from 9am to 9pm. 410 miles were covered by all who participated showing a shared unity and support of all those who have unjustly suffered from this atrocity. They walked in

support of them, reminding us of their hardship and bringing awareness to their plight.

Many also participated financially, **RAISING \$7,780!** We are grateful to *Schmitt Music* for sponsoring use of the Orono track so that all the proceeds raised from this day goes directly to *Lutheran World Relief*.

LWR works with the needs of the many refugee camps. For those unavailable to walk this is an important way to be part of the ongoing awareness and support needed at this time in Ukraine and the supportive countries bearing the pressures and needs all these hurting individuals have.

Most important concerning this event is the value of prayer and that what the students actively did on one evening in March has carried on beyond a one-time occurrence. Let's all commit to praying for a peaceful end to this war sothat the refugees can return to their homes and rebuild their lives once again.

Where did you grow up?
