divinely sacred



In the prologue of her book *Somewhere* in the Unknown World, Kao Kalia Yang briefly recounts her experience of being a refugee from Laos who eventually

settled in Minnesota. She attended school with many other refugee children like her, the older among them recounting stories through word and drawings of what they'd experienced in the trauma of war. "The older children," she writes, "who had seen more than we had, wanted to let their stories out for us younger ones to carry the weight of their memories with them."

As she grew, she realized her role in ensuring these kinds of stories were heard and eventually told on behalf of another. "I'd too often witnessed," she continues, "members of my family and community recount their experiences, weeping as they returned to their past, only to have it live and die in the moment because the listeners deemed other stories more important."

Yang's reflection on the stories she holds for others, and the responsibility she's embraced to tell those stories, highlights the importance of the power of *hearing* and *being heard*. When we help carry the stories and memories of another, and when we have the space to share what makes us who we are, we share a connection that is **divinely sacred**.

When we explored the topic of storytelling during Lent 2023 and created that space for members of our congregation to tell a piece of their story, we were struck by the impact the practice had on so many. In an effort to listen to the voice of God's Spirit, we endeavor to engage more deeply the work of hearing and being heard so we may discover that deep connection that waits for those who do.

I pray in the months ahead you find ways to connect with one another and the divine through story-sharing and story-hearing. Pay attention to the ways this comes to life in worship and the many ministries of Trinity. And as the opportunity arises, take time to hear and be heard, joining together as one to carry the weight and wonder of each other's story.





Wished I had initiated more conversation; wished I had created moments for social engagement; wished I had made the time to acknowledge the admiration and respect I held for him/her...wished we had shared stories.

This year I invited a friend to coffee. I have known Dave for 30 or more years, during which we were both members of our mutually valued Trinity family. But, I did not really know Dave. You will not regret having learned of their journey, having heard just some of their story...almost without fail.

One of the main reasons I decided to attend this Gathering is because of curiosity (and selfishly wanting to taste the foods). With growing up going to church, I often only saw no more than 10 kids in Sunday school and around 50 in confirmation, from which I was unable to fully comprehend how big my church community truly is. When we got to New Orleans the city was full of kids my age in matching t-shirts, sweating in 90-degree heat. But it wasn't until the first Mass Gathering that I truly understood how vast a space we covered. I sat in the Smoothie King Stadium taking in all the people, I couldn't help but be in awe. There was a whole 16,000 of us and what a sight it was! When we walked out of the stadium, for at least a mile, all you could see was people. As we walked side by side, I finally realized how big my community really was. There are millions of us in the world and this convention barely scraped the surface.

This trip helped me in a lot of ways. I was able to deepen my faith, listen to the stories of others, and expand my relationships with my peers. But most of all I realized that I am not alone in this journey. Being in a relationship with God was never something that I was experiencing alone. The idea of my church community expanded in a way I never imagined possible.


West Suburban Grief Coalition

(WSGC) serves a mission to provide caring support and education for persons grieving the death of a loved one. The Coalition is supported by 15 area churches, including Trinity Lutheran, to provide a safe, non-threatening environment where people can share and understand feelings of grief. Through weekly speakers, followed by small-group discussion among members with similar losses, attendees may grieve openly with others who "get it" and learn how to manage their ongoing grief so that they can move forward with fulfilling lives.

As it has for over 30 years, WSGC meets year-round on Thursdays (except holidays). Small discussion groups include spouse loss; child loss and friends & family (all other) loss. Volunteer facilitators are trained and supported by a licensed therapist. Sessions are free to all and church affiliation is not necessary.

While there is no right or wrong way to grieve, West Suburban Grief Coalition encourages healthy grieving that can lead to insight, personal growth and a meaningful post-loss life.

The Council has approved major projects: the roof & boiler, totaling \$529,000!

The **64-year-old boiler** has been removed and two smaller energy-efficient boilers are coming next week.







The roof project, a fully adhered EPDM (synthetic rubber roofing membrane) with added insulation begins in mid-October.

Determining the details of the next priorities: security and sanctuary technology improvements of lighting, sound, and video are in process.



During my sabbatical, I went to **Holden Village**—a Lutheran retreat center in the North Cascades of Washington. One of the first things I noticed that surprised me was how intergenerational the community was. The ages of us "Villagers" went from rambunctious toddlers to senior citizens using canes or walkers even on the steep inclines of the paths there. Evening worship (vespers) was held each night with close to 300 villagers attending, strong voices blended together in song and prayer, filling the large room.

The Holy Spirit gave me a great blessing the night communion was served when I was asked by the Village pastor to serve bread along with her. While Holden places emphasis on the Village being a community, two days into my stay, I still wasn't "feeling it". But that night as I ripped pieces of bread off and placed them in the

outstretched hands of my fellow villagers, I began feeling a deeper connection to these people I didn't even know. In that brief span of 15 minutes as Christ's body and blood were served to all, it was about receiving the real presence of Jesus into our bodies, affirming our oneness in Him. Through this, the Spirit reminded me about what makes us community, not just at Holden Village but throughout the world; it is what Christ has done for us, binding us together through his body and blood. This is a truth that will never change or fade over time—and this truth is just as valid in the communion line as it is in the line at the grocery store. Christ has united the world-past, present, and future—and given us an amazing gift of grace and love meant to be shared

with friend and stranger alike!
